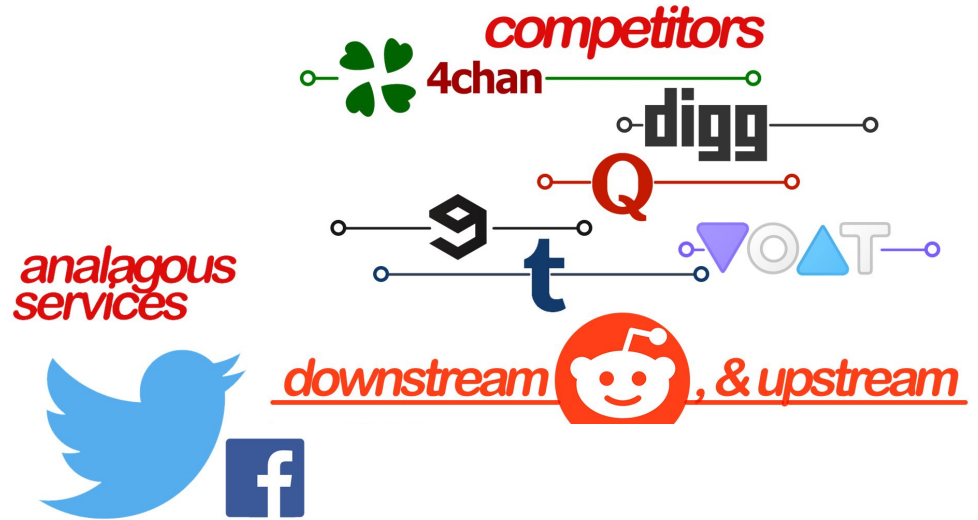

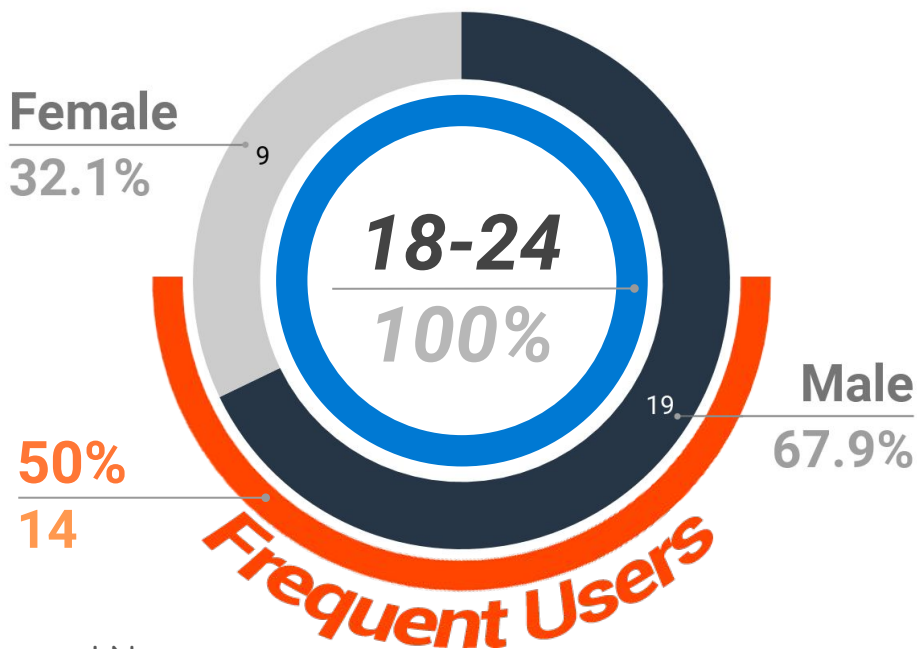
Competitive and Market Review

- Analysis of Competitors
- Rating Systems
 - Reddit = Variant of Trend
- User Interface
 - Reddit = More Crowded
- Content Offered
 - Reddit = News Aggregation
- Typical User Base
 - Sample user = Young Men



Survey Results









- User Group
 - Majority (68%) Male, 18-24
- High Frequency
 - Daily and/or 2-3 times per week
 - Vs. Monthly and so on
 - 50/50 on usage of similar sites
 - Experienced users
- Feelings on New vs. Old Reddit
 - Generally-neutral Old ; Positively-swayed New
 - Felt the new could still use more work
 - **Not likely to recommend it**
 - How can we improve the rework?

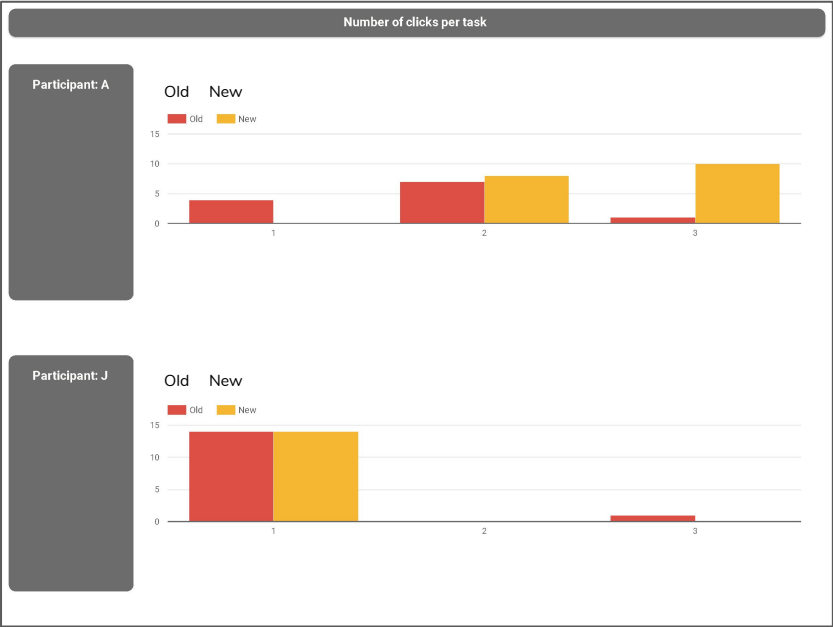

Usability Testing

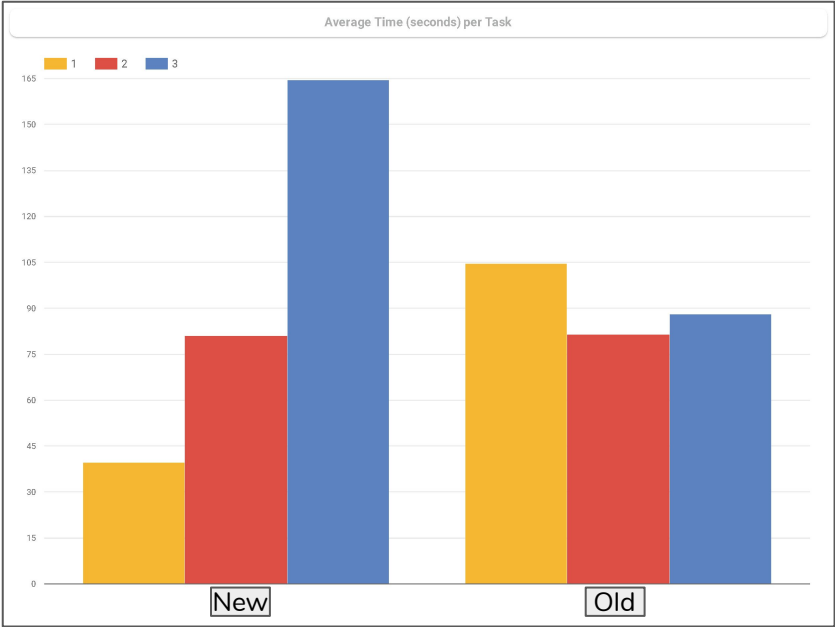
- Sample User Group
 - User 1 - Total Novice
 - User 2 - Reddit Mobile User, Desktop Novice
- Tasks
 - Task 1
 - Login into an account given to participant
 - Disable E-Mail Notifications
 - Task 2
 - Sorting by upvotes/downvotes
 - Task 3
 - Create a post and give it a tag
- Terminology and rating system caused inefficiencies and confusion.

Average time spent on each task by version.

- Reggie has never used Reddit before attending Purdue.
- He needs a platform where he can find information about the campus, classes, and other areas related to Purdue.
- He finds the terminology on Reddit confusing, as he is used to Twitter.



The Root of the Problem

- Terminology is confusing to novice users

- “Community”, “SubReddit”, “Tags”
 - *Hashtags*



- Ranking / Filtering systems also confusing

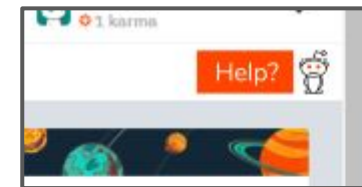
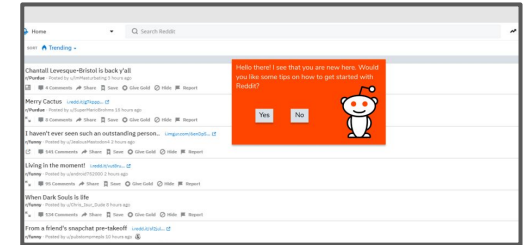
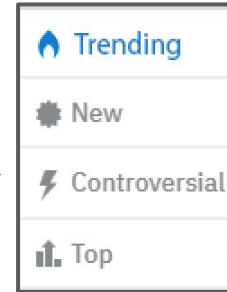
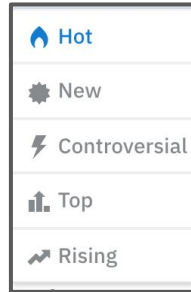
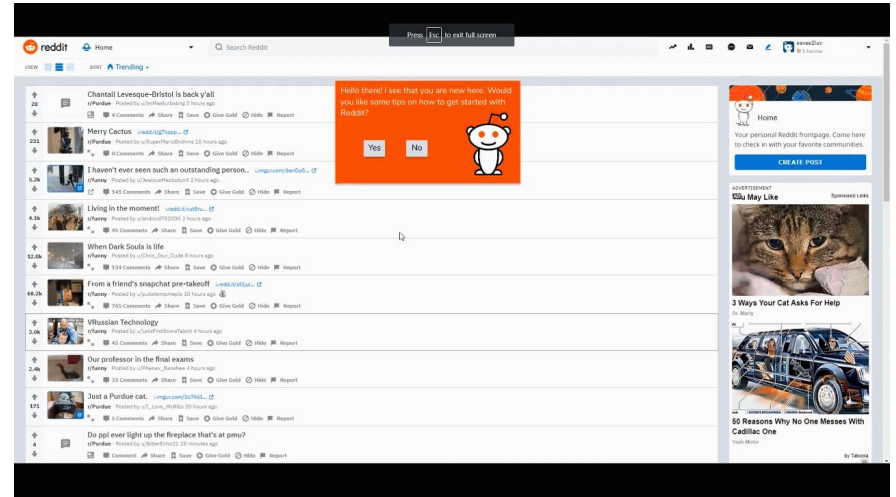
- Upvotes and Downvotes

- Certain visual layout choices could be improved/clarified



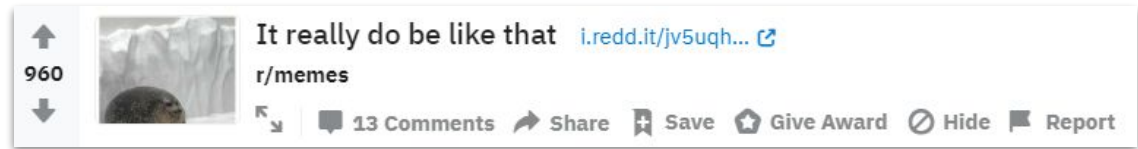
Our Solution

- “Help” feature for new users
 - Gives missing information
- Streamlined Filters
 - Removing excess



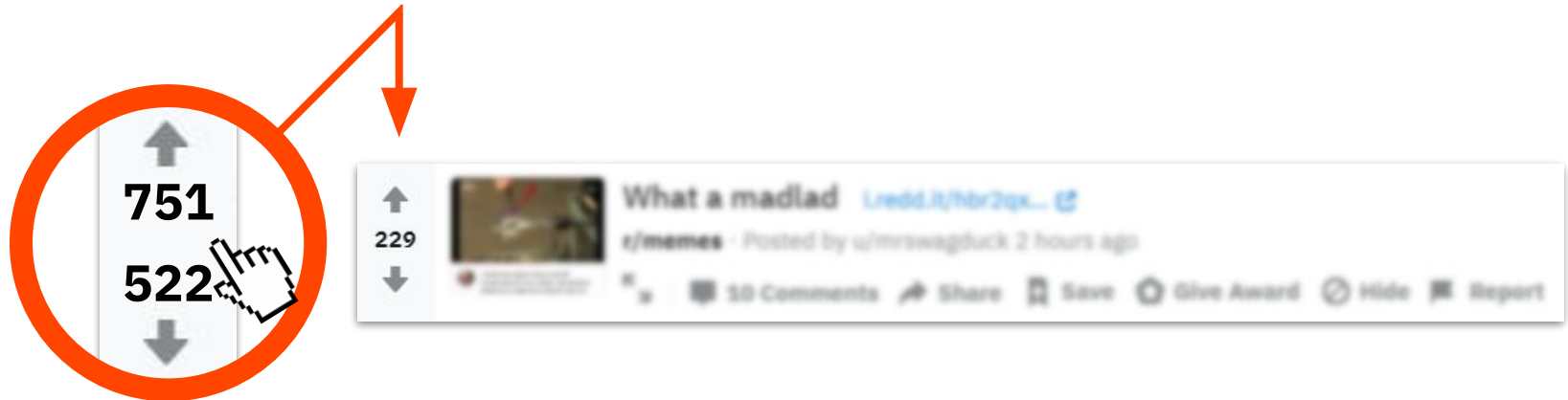
Follow-Up User Feedback

- Liked the help feature
 - “Would have immediately used it on my first attempt”
 - Liked that it immediately explained terminology
- Positive reactions to New Reddit being the foundation
 - Consistent with reactions from first User Feedback session
- Some notes that rating system could still use improvement
 - Variance from trending ratings systems



Future Plans

- Address further organization issues
- Continue gathering feedback
- Add function for when you hover over upvotes and downvotes it displays the number.
